#### Dear Delta Omicron Members,

At the very end of last school year, my principal called us to an emergency faculty meeting in the morning before the school day began. These early-morning meetings never deliver good news. A former student has suddenly and tragically died, just days before he was to graduate high school. We'll need to be thinking of his family, said my principal, and his younger brother, Owen. Only then did I realize the relationship: Owen is one of my chorus students.

Owen is possibly the most talented young dancer that I have ever taught. This young man should be auditioning for major dance companies. When the school year started, I told Owen I had an idea. What did he think about creating a dance to one of our chorus songs? Just think about it, I said. See if something we are singing appeals to you or lends itself well to expression in dance. He finally selected "More Love" (Mark Miller, Hal Leonard, available SAB and two-part) which we sang at the winter concert. The lyrics talk about the world we could create if we only had more love, less hate. "When fear and violence touch our lives/Hate separates, seeks to divide/Our faith in love won't be denied/More love, less hate." I played the cajón at the concert, so I was sitting on the drum and mostly looking at the guest conductor. Owen had created a lyrical jazz dance to accompany the song. I hadn't really had the opportunity to see it all together; the song, the lyrics, the piano, the dance, until that night at the concert. I made the mistake of looking up at Owen while he was dancing and the powerful feeling of hope and promise hit me so strongly that my eyes started to cloud. I had to hurry up and

look down at the floor to prevent myself from bursting into tears in the middle of the stage, while sitting on a drum in front of 70 middle schoolers and their parents. If ever we wonder about the importance of the arts in our students lives, Owen's few minutes of dance answered that question. Here was a young man able to dance on with hope and with promise and without fear. I was incredibly proud of him. I felt in that moment that he would be ok, we all would be ok.

And so, brother and sisters in Delta Omicron, we dance on into a new year with hope and with promise.





#### Delta Omicron Crest for Trademark Renewal

The crest of Delta Omicron trademark is up for renewal. In the Spring 2019 issue of "The Wheel," Dr. Jonny Ramsey explained the trademarks to the fraternity:



The Crest was trademarked on June 17, 2014. The application

for the crest trademark

was initiated by National Historian Jonny Ramsey and completed by Tamara Bennett, Trademark and Media Lawyer of Bennett Law of Lewisville, Texas. The first step was to secure the rights to the crest design since it was the design property of Herff Jones Company through its previous merging with Burr, Patterson, and Auld. Property rights were ceded to the fraternity through a letter from Herff Jones and this letter is held in the fraternity historical files.

In the past, the oversight and renewal of trademarks was handled by the National Historian. But with the increase to three trademarks rather than one and with the constant need to comply with applications renewals, the Board of Directors contracted with the Tamara Bennett Law Firm in Texas in 2013 to manage all trademark renewals and help with litigation if needed. That service continues today.

The renewal cost for the crest trademark is \$3,200.



The application deadline is April 15, 2024 for Delta Omicron Summer Scholarships. Awards will be determined by May 1, 2024.

We are offering all but the Dorothy Mazzulla Clark scholarship this year.

There have never been so many ways to become involved in Delta Omicron. There are opportunities available to students and adults who share our ideals and devotion to music. This article is meant to describe the different ways to "do" D.O., the differences between them, and hopefully inspire you to be on the lookout for new members.

#### **Collegiate Members**

This is the typical or traditional way to be inducted into the fraternity. College students who are music majors or have an interest in music learn about Delta Omicron and are initiated through the fraternity education process. We have had a great year of growth so far this past fall semester! Delta Omicron is always looking to expand and create new college chapters. If you know of a college that is interested in Delta Omicron, please reach out to our Director of Extension. We would love to help.

#### Alumni Members

After you graduate, you automatically become an alumni member. Be sure to pay your Lifetime Membership dues so you can remain in good

standing and claim Delta Omicron on your professional resume. You can join a D.O. alumni club or chapter that is close to you. No chapters or clubs close to you? You can create one. Reach out to our Director of Extension for details. If you cannot join a local alumni chapter or club, no worries. You are considered an "Alumni-at-Large." Alumni-at-large still hold important roles in our fraternity. Alumni are the backbone of Delta Omicron. Stay involved. There are so many good things going on beyond the walls of your college campus.

#### New Alumni Members

This has been an exciting new addition. We are now able to initiate adults into alumni chapters. To join, prospective members follow a near-identical process as college initiates. Just be sure to get your new member approved by the national second vice president before you start the process. After the vice president looks over your prospective members biography and gives approval, your alumni chapter can initiate the members. If you know of adults who are musicians and worthy to wear the lyre of gold, please ask if they would like to become a member. We hope that alumni chapters will take advantage of this opportunity to grow your membership.

#### **Professional Members**

There has been some confusion about this role in the past. Professional membership is an honorary-type designation. It is rarely given. A professional members is a person who is a local professional performing artist, music professional, or college professor. These are people that Delta Omicron would like to recognize for their outstanding efforts and contributions to the music world or on your campus. They are not someone with just an interest in music, rather they are working in the professional music world (hence the name). Professional members must be voted on and approved by the national board of directors. This is a key difference between general new alumni members and a professional member. Upon initiation, professional members become alumni members of that chapter that initiates them. They can pay lifetime membership dues to become members in good standing.

#### National Honorary Members

These extraordinary members must have a spectacular national or international music biography. They must be approved unanimously by the National Board of Directors. There is no financial obligation to the honorary member. Any chapter or the board can nominate people to receive this special honor. If you know of someone who deserves this designation, please submit their name to the Board to be considered.

#### National Patron or Patroness

These must be approved by the National Board of Directors. A patron or patroness is someone who helps the fraternity. Perhaps they allow you to use their performance center or contribute financially in some way to your chapter. They are friends of the organization. If you do not know who your local patrons and patronesses are, ask! We can help you get in contact with them. Better yet, submit your list of helpful hands to the board so we can get them approved.

Now you know the many exciting ways you can become a member or friend of Delta Omicron. It's time to get out there and attract new members. An organization is only as good as its people. Luckily, we have the best people around. Let's expand our musical family!

# Delta Omicron International Music Fraternity Triennial Composition Competition For Clarinet and Piano

Judges TBA

Awards: One Thousand Dollars and Première at the 2025 International Delta Omicron Conference

Purpose To encourage composers To give their work public performances To further the cause of contemporary music

#### <u>Rules</u>

**Eligibility:** This competition is open to all composers 18 or older. This is regardless of any music fraternity affiliation. To be eligible, the composition shall NOT have been previously commissioned, published or publicly performed (except for feedback) prior to the time that judging is completed in the summer of 2024. To be eligible for the award, the winner of the competition must wait to publish her/his work until after the première performance in July 2025.

**Music Requirements:** The composition should be for standard Bb and/or A Clarinet and Piano (NOT Eb, Bass, Alto or any other member of the extended clarinet family). The duration should be from seven to fifteen minutes.

Manuscripts should be in .pdf format, either notated with digital software (Finale, Sibelius, etc.) or LEGIBLY written in ink and scanned. The score should be signed with a pseudonym (not the author's actual name) and free from any marks that would identify the composer to the judges. The body of the email should clearly list the entrant's pseudonym, actual name, mailing address, email address and preferred phone number. This is only for the use of the Competition Chair and will not be shared with the judges. Submissions should be emailed to do.2025.triennial.comp@gmail.com with the subject: "Submission to Delta Omicron 2025 Triennial Competition." Hard copy manuscripts will not be accepted.

**Entry Fees:** Composers may submit multiple works for consideration, but an entry fee of \$25.00 (US\$) should accompany each submitted score paid via PayPal to Delta Omicron International Fraternity. A given submission will not be considered complete until this fee has been received. Note: once a score has been submitted, there will be no refund of the entry fee if the entrant chooses to withdraw from the competition.

#### All Entries And Fees Must Be Received No Later Than 11:59 p.m. On March 31, 2024.

**Awards:** The awards shall be \$1,000 and the Première Performance at the 2025 Delta Omicron International Music Fraternity's 2025 Delta Omicron Triennial Conference. The monetary award is underwritten in part by the Delta Omicron Foundation, Inc. The composer is encouraged, though not required, to attend the Première Performance. All expenses to the Conference are the responsibility of the composer.

All of the above rules must be followed for a submission to be considered complete; the Competition Chair will alert you to any needed corrections. The decision of the judges will be FINAL. The prize will be withheld if, in the opinion of the judges, none of the compositions submitted is of a caliber warranting an award.

## Delta Omicron Welcomes Hector Olivera New National Patron By, Dr. Kay Calfee Wideman

Internationally renowned concert organist, Maestro Hector Olivera, was inducted as a Delta Omicron National Patron on November 12, 2023. Dr. Kay Calfee Wideman, a former Delta Omicron International President, conducted the ceremony. Maestro Olivera was the guest concert organist at Druid Hills Presbyterian Church in Atlanta. After over a year of

restoration, the 1940 Aeolian-Skinner pipe organ is only one of nineteen G. Donald Harrison signature organs known to exist today. Maestro Olivera was presented with the National Patron Certificate and key pin at the conclusion of the concert.

Born in Buenos Aires, Maestro Olivera was first encouraged at age three to begin playing the pipe organ by his organist father.

His talent was immediately apparent. By age five, he was appointed organist at that city's Church of the Immaculate Conception. At age six, he entered Buenos Aires Conservatory. By age nine, he had composed a suite for oboe and string orchestra, performed by the Buenos Aires Symphony Orchestra. At age twelve, he entered the University of Buenos Aires and by age eighteen

had performed more than three hundred concerts throughout Latin America. In 1965, New York's Juilliard School of Music offered him a scholarship. He moved to the United States to continue his education. Three years later, he won the National Improvisation Contest by the American Guild of Organists and his professional career was launched.

Maestro Olivera has performed solo organ concerts throughout the world in a galaxy of prestigious venues. These include Carnegie Hall (New York), Royal Albert Hall (London), Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane Town Halls (Australia), Spivey Hall (Atlanta) as part of the 1996 cultural Games Olympic festivities, Hong Kong Cultural Center, Shenzhen Concert Hall (China) and a massive audience of 5,000 at the Cathedral of Notre Dame (Paris). He has also performed as the featured soloist for the Pittsburgh Symphony, Minnesota Orchestra, Dallas Symphony, Cleveland Orchestra, Amsterdam Baroque Ensemble and many others.

Maestro Olivera's November 12, 2023 concert included J.S. Bach's "Passacaglia and Fugue in C Minor," and C. Franck's "Finale in B Flat, Opus 21." Known for his improvisational display, his "Improvisation on a submitted theme" was one of the highlights of this concert.

## D.O.s in the News

Janine Tiffe (Mu Chapter) participated in the international conference "Gender Relations in Wind Music: from Clichés to Diversity," which took place at the Cultural and University Centre of Oberschützen (Kunstuniversität Graz) between 4th and 5th May, 2023. This event brought together scholars and musicians from the United States, Austria, Germany, and Luxemburg. Below is an excerpt from the conference report by Clara Sersale:

"Ethnomusicologist Janine Tiffe (Kent State University, Glauser School of Music) continued the reflection on the role of band conductors by considering Jane Copenhefer's commitment in shaping the Licking County-4-H Band (Ohio) as a positive band environment through inclusion and queerness, in a geographic location where queer people were 'popularly represented as out of place.' Interviews conducted with the musicians indicated how this band was central to many participants' identities and how this environment was perceived as overall more positive and emotionally supportive than that of other school bands. Copenhefer's leadership disrupted the US band world's norms rooted in hierarchical military frameworks and traditions, with the aim of the betterment of her band and community."
